

Letter from the President of the College




In these pages I trust you will find some new and enlightening information about Imperial Valley College. We have an amazing story to tell and the numbers here are evidence of that. This past spring (2016) saw the highest number of graduates to have ever passed through the college's doors since it opened in 1962.

What follows is certified final data from 2015-16, the last complete academic year as this is being written. Here are some highlights:

- Over \$29 million dollars was awarded in grants, scholarships, and financial aid during 2014-15;
- Fall 2015 enrollment was 8,041;
- In 2014-15, 57.7% of all enrolled students are first generation students;
- > 1,699 degrees and certificates were awarded in 2015-16; 4.36% increase from 2014-15, 23.47% increase from 2013-14 graduates;
- Median Credit Section Size was 28.

And that is just a sampling. These data also reflects the fact that of all of the components of our state's educational system, community colleges are the most cost effective. However, in 2015-16, per student funding for IVC and other California community colleges was 44% below the California State University System and 68% below the University of California system. Our per-student funding is also 28% below that of K-12.

I trust the data and other information provided in this Fact Book will help answer questions you may have about or college.






Imperial Valley College Mission Statement and Institutional Student Learning Outcomes




Fall 2016 High School of Origin






Unduplicated Headcount 2007-2016


Fall Headcount

Student Enrollment












Part-Time Students



Full-Time Equivalent Students





Headcount, Duplicated Enrollment, and FTES




Persistence, Fill, and Success Rates


Persistence Rate from Fall to Spring

Success Rates For Transferable Classes









Writing (N=1,479)

- ≥ 2 Levels Before Transfer






Math (N=1,834)


Disabled Students Programs and Services




Total Amount Awarded to Students

Glossary

ACADEMIC YEAR: Period of time schools use to measure a quantity of study. Academic year for Imperial Valley College is from July 1st to July 31st.

ACCUPLACER: Computerized test that is used for Math, Reading, Writing and ESL placement at Imperial Valley College.

DATA MART: A database program maintained on the Chancellor's Office website (www.cccco.edu/division/tris/mis/reports.htm) that enables external users to query student and staff MIS data and generate aggregated reports by college, district or statewide.

DISABLED STUDENTS PROGRAMS AND SERVICES: A state-funded categorical program that provides funds for the additional costs related to supporting students with disabilities in community colleges.

EXTENDED OPPORTUNITY PROGRAMS AND SERVICES: A state-funded program to support the enrollment of disadvantaged students through services including counseling and advisement, tutoring, peer support, books and financial aid.

FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT STUDENTS: Community college workload measure for instruction and instructional services. A "full-time student" is defined as one who is enrolled in 12 or more units.

HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT: The actual number of students enrolled.

PERSISTENCE: The percentage of students who return to college for their second year or term.

RETENTION: The number of enrollments with grades of A, B, C, D, F, P, NP, or I*.

SPECIAL ADMITS: High school students who are able to attend community colleges for advanced scholastic course work with parental and principal permission.

SUCCESS RATE: The measurement of enrollments with grades of A, B, C or P.

UNDUPLICATED ANNUAL HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT: Represents the number of distinct individuals who have enrolled in any community college course or program during a specified period.

WORK STUDY: A type of financial aid program that provides money for students in return for working at the college or in off-campus placements made by the college.
